During the Spring/Summer IN YOUR FACE conducted a series of interviews with 311, using questions generated by you, the fan. Here are the results! WHERE DO YOU SEE YOURSELVES IN 15 YEARS?

TIM: Hopefully, fifteen years from now we'll be sounding our best ever. Each year we grow and I plan on improving on down the road.

NICK: In 15 years I see 311 with as big of a cult following as we can get as long as we keep making unusual music. In 15 years I see inefficient corporations such as Ticketmaster cut out by the Internet.

P-nut: Having a large cult following like the Grateful Dead would be the ideal thing to happen. But in my honest opinion I think we will be more widespread than that.

CHAD: We'll be making music for the moon people. 5th and 6th dimension people should be in touch with us by then.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO MOVE TO CALIFORNIA?

SA: The chillin vibes.

CHAD: Opportunity.

P-nut: It was between California and New York! And it was a weather decision more than anything else--and Nick and Chad had already lived here.

TIM: The weather suits my clothes. Sun, mountains, ocean.

NICK: I choose to live in Cali because I like to do outside stuff like swimming, surfing, and in-line skating.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE ROUTINES YOU GO THRU BEFORE YOU START TO JAM OR WRITE A SONG?

CHAD: I stretch the muscles. Warm up hands.

P-nut: Juggle. Pace a little. Breathe deeply--for breath is life.

TIM: I stretch my muscles before each show. A lot of times I'll be playing my guitar and riffs come out; other times I hear them in my head first, then translate them on the guitar.

Nick: I feel like writing music a couple of hours after I wake up. Then I forget to eat. Then I remember and I eat three hams.

WERE YOU IN ANY OTHER BAND BEFORE 311?

TIM: I was in Simplemania, The Eds (with Nick) and the Bushmen (with Chad).

SA: A band called Heist. In the 8th grade we covered "Back in Black" (AC/DC) for the school talent show. I played bass.

P-nut: I've almost always been in 311.

NICK: My other bands (in choronological order) were: The Prokaine Guns, the Extras, The Eds, The Westside Concert Jazz Band and Unity.

WHAT OTHER JOBS HAVE YOU GUYS HAD?

TIM: I worked as a food service assistant at a hospital and at Pickles (a record store).

P-nut: I worked at Shoney's for a week with a complete derelict as my manager.

NICK: I have always worked in restaurants except for a short stint at the Guitar Center.

WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN YOU AREN'T ON TOUR OR WRITING MUSIC?

TIM: Read, paint, see films, exercise, sleep, play with my dog, chill.

P-nut: Drive around. Enjoy the many modern film masterpieces on my couch. Read obscure philosophic material. Get symbols tattoed over the majority of my body.

CHAD: We do the same things everyone else does.

NICK: I like to go to restaurants and clubs, surf.

WHAT ARE EACH OF YOUR MUSICAL INFLUENCES?

TIM: Jerry Garcia, Carlos Santana, John McLaughlin, Jimi Hendrix, Bob Marley, Reggae Music, Jazz guitarists, Bad Brains, Phish, Led Zeppelin, etc. Lots and lots of bands; all sorts of good music. Paintings, writings, books and other art forms inspire me as well as the sun, moon, stars, ocean and mountains.

P-nut: Well, I grew up listening to early Red Hot Chili Pepper stuff. Iron Maiden, the Smiths, the Pixies, Fishbone, Fudge Tunnel.

CHAD: Glyccekx, 4th dimension rockers, 4th dimension thinkers.

NICK: My influences are The Clash, Bob Marley, Cole Porter, RHC
Peppers, Beastie Boys, Bad Brains, REM, U2, Frank Sinatra, De La Soul, Buju Banton, Prince. The other members of 311 are definitely my biggest influences. Don't forget The Fugees, Joni Mitchell, Massive Attack, Tribe Called Quest, The Beatles, Led Zepelin, Cypress Hill, Eric B and Rakim, Frank Black.

HAS THE GANG SEEN ANY UFO'S LATELY?

NICK: Never, but they gotta be out there.

CHAD: They come in your sleep. P-nut: I will and everyone should keep your eyes to the skies.

SA: N.O. spells no.

INTERVIEW (CONTINUED)

HAS THE BAND CAUSED STRUCTURAL DAMAGE TO ANY BUILDING?

P-nut: It felt like we were going to break the Mercury Theatre in Denver.

NICK: Our old house. Chad's pet rat ate through the waterbed, warping the floor.

WHAT TV DO YOU WATCH?

NICK: I watch cop shows and sitcoms and movies and the news and MTV.

CHAD: It's all Brainwash material particles for the frequency waves in the brain.

P-nut: Comedy Central all the way. Plus the Simpsons and Jeopardy.

TIM: I used to watch the Next Generation. For tv I like the Kids in the Hall, X Files and Chicago Bulls games. WE'D LIKE TO HEAR SOME IDEAS ON THE ALIEN/SPACE THING.

TIM: Space seems to be the next frontier. Other than deep oceans and polar caps, spaceship Earth has already been explored thoroughly. Humans need to start leaving Earth to see what's out there. Space migration seems to be one of the next steps in human evolution.

P-nut: There is no doubt in my mind that alien (to us) intelligences exist all around us and blanket our universe.

CHAD: It's all hooked up. They'll be here in big numbers in 1997 or 2003 depending on the time glitches the government chooses.

NICK: I believe that in every solar system at some point of the cooling process the conditions for life will be just right. Energy's natural tendency to organize will do the rest.

DO YOU HAVE SOME "WORDS OF WISDOM" FOR PEOPLE STARTING NEW BANDS?

TIM: It's important to create art that you enjoy playing and is meaningful to you. Keep on keepin' on.

P-nut: The difficult and most respectful thing is uniqueness and positivity.

NICK: I have always felt 311 had a valid contribution to music. If a musician does not feel this way, he would be better suited doing something else as his/her main focus.

WHAT ABOUT YOUR OLD MATERIAL?

P-nut: We are constantly striving for newer even more different music--not trying to jazz up Slinky!

"The past four years have been almost dream-like for these Omaha natives. And the most interesting part is that they did it the old-school way; not through imitating what they heard on the radio, nor through walking the well-worn road of power-pop-punk, but through innovative sounds and a grueling tour schedule. Often playing five shows a week for five months straight, 311 continues to realize the importance of remembering who they are. You will find no pretension, or cockiness from the members of this band. They are just five white guys from Omaha, Nebraska who are doing what they love, and being successful at it."

Heaven knows they've needed a good attitude at times. In the summer of 1993, the band's RV exploded into flames, destroying all of their equipment, the Volkswagen van they were towing and most of their personal possession.

'It was a weird experience,'
Sexton said. 'But it would have been
weirder if we'd just sat around. You've got
to keep going. All we need to survive is
our bodies and our brains. We can always
buy more equipment and more clothes.'

For the band 311 and its fans, the future is now.

'I think our music--I'm not saying this to be conceited--is just a little bit ahead of its time, 'said Chad Sexton, the group's drummer. 'I think we're a couple of years ahead of radio. I think the future of music has to have some sort of adventure in it, instead of repeating the same old stuff over and over for five minutes. You can't wait for people to catch up with you.'

'I think you can explain the energy by us being friends before we were in a band. We've been playing together since 1990, so it's just an energy that evolves from the experience of playing

together and knowing what the other musician is doing There's a special energy or special vibe when you get a positive experience like that."

"Too many cops and too many arrests at Little Rock's Riverfront Amphitheatre are bad for the concert industry. And that's what happened at the latest rock 'n' roll shows on the river., says promoter Butch Stone of the Concert Company. He says police enforcement seems tighter than necessary at recent concerts. 'Enforcement there--it's over the top,' Stone said. 'I've got eyes-I can see. 'During the last three concerts-Alice Cooper, Zonefest with 311 headlining, and Steppenwolf, police made nearly 100 arrests total. It may not be a startling number, given the fact that the three concerts drew a total of 14,000 people. Additional personnel had been requested..since fans at the three latest concerts were expected to be less law-abiding then, say, fans at a Christian music concert.'

"Nick Hexum, lead singer of the group 311, said the band feeds off a moshing crowd.

'To have people bouncing right up front is great,' says Hexum, an 11year veteran of mosh pits. 'Once you're in the pit, there's nowhere else to be. There's a certain thrill-sport aspect to it.'

Hexum, who is 26, thinks of moshing as a dance without boundaries.

'I liken it to a tribal dance,' he says. 'That's what we've been missing in American youth culture, a tribal dance. Now we've got one. It's not a fad. It's what's happening for a generation.'

And his advice for those who think moshing is too dangerous: Then just don't do it."
